<p>This course is designed to provide students, who are interested in entering medical professions, with an in depth overview of the terminology used by a variety of professionals in the field. Furthermore, the course will provide students with the tools necessary to build a variety of medical terms by learning each of the specific word elements. Body systems to be covered include integumentary, respiratory, cardiovascular, lymphatic, digestive, urinary, reproductive, endocrine, nervous, and musculoskeletal systems. The course will also cover terminology related to the eyes and ears.</p>

<p>This course provides a chronological and thematic survey of major social, political, cultural, economic, and intellectual developments in Britain from 1485 to the present. Through primary and secondary sources, students will encounter a wide variety of topics including the role of the Reformation and religion in the British Isles, the formation and expansion of the British Empire, the transition to parliamentary democracy, and role of Britain in the world today. Students will use the history of the British Isles as a means to understand the role of European powers in a global context.</p>

<p>Miracles can be defined as special divine acts that occur in human history. Not only are the biblical writings replete with miracles, they have been reported in many other contexts. Sometimes these stories prompt inquirers to ask questions: Are miracles possible? Are they identifiable? Are they mythological? Are they unscientific? This course will help students to answer these kinds of questions and examine some of the classical challenges involved with the credibility of miracle claims.</p>
